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What Audition Songs You Need

(adapted from musicaltheatreaudition.com)

1. **Do your research!** What is the company asking you to do for the vocal audition? If it is 16 bars of music, choose the part of the song that shows off your best vocal singing.

2. **Avoid Auditioner Fatigue** by staying away from songs from the latest and greatest musical. To stay safe, avoid songs from plays that have been on-Broadway in the last five years.

3. Always Choose Audition Songs Appropriate to Your Age & Life Experience

Just because you like a song doesn't make it a good song for you to sing in an audition. In order to believably portray the character of a song, you have to relate to the content of the lyrics on a personal level. Choose a song that you can relate to *emotionally*. There are lots of people who can sing well - what will set you apart is your ability to communicate emotion.

3. Always Choose Audition Songs in an Appropriate Style

What sets a show tune apart from other songs is its *character*. A show tune is sung by a very obvious character, one that you have to become when you sing it. Don't choose an audition song that is anything but a show tune unless you are asked specifically NOT to do a song from a musical. If you are unsure about the style you should be looking for, look for other shows by the same composer as the show you are auditioning for.

4. Your Audition Songs Should Show Your Strengths First

Choose the best audition song you have to offer. Choose an audition song that is within your comfortable singing range - this is not the time to stretch for a note, as blowing a note will almost certainly also blow your chances for a role. The audition panel will expect you to show off the very best you have to offer, and this means performing a song that is well polished and well rehearsed.

5. Choose Audition Songs That Let You Be Yourself

Be the first YOU, not the 52nd Idina Menzel. Many auditioners have the tendency to try and copy the style of whoever sang the recorded version of their audition song. DON'T DO THAT! Pick a song that you can identify with, and use it to show your own personality and style, not someone else's. Make sure you practice with only the accompaniment - singing along with a recording will not help you develop your own style.



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6. Accompaniment For Your Audition Songs

There are three choices when it comes to accompaniment.

The first is to use a piano accompanist, as usually one is provided.

The second is to sing a capella.

Finally, you can use recorded accompaniment.

It is important to be aware that not all auditions will give you a choice. Many auditions will insist that you use their accompanist.

If you are given a choice, you need to be aware of a few factors that should influence your decision.

Accompaniment will keep you on pitch, and will fill in the instrumental sections of the piece. Live accompaniment also best mimics how you would be performing in the show, and demonstrates how well you can work with an accompanist. However, using an accompanist requires you to have sheet music *in the correct key*, and you will need to practice singing with the accompaniment before the audition.

While using pre-recorded accompaniment makes rehearsing easy, it limits your ability to make creative changes in dynamics and tempo.

Singing a capella should be done only when absolutely necessary.



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How to Conduct Yourself at an Audition

DO pay attention to your personal appearance. Look your best. Dress casually and neatly in clothes that allow freedom of movement and are flattering to your physique. We suggest two "outfits"—one for the dance audition and one for the song and monologue. Beware of current fashions that are not flattering to you physically and/or limit mobility.

DO bring the right tools for the job: For the dance audition, invest in some basic dance wear -- an ensemble that will show your figure or physique in action. Women may wear character shoes, jazz shoes or ballet slippers, leotards, tights, dance skirts or non-bulky warm-up wear. Men may wear jazz or ballet shoes, tights, t-shirts or shorts. No-one should wear oversized sweat pants or shirts (in fact, you may be asked to remove them!)

DO consider that your audition really begins the moment you arrive and ends when you leave. That means the way you behave (and are seen to behave) is a factor in whether or not you will be cast.

Show that you are well prepared and have done your research about the show and the theatre company.

Exude confidence as you enter the room, say your name with authority, look your best, thank the auditioners, accompanist and stage manager for their time and leave with the air of a job well done.

You may do a brilliant audition and ruin your chances by appearing obnoxious. If you seem to have "attitude," or are a "diva", you are unlikely to be cast.

DO be confident. Like yourself. Be proud of who you are. In short, make the director want to cast you. Arouse their interest through the sheer force of your personality. In other words, true to yourself.

DO acknowledge nerves. Auditioning is nerve-wracking. It is OK to be nervous. Take a deep breath. Tell yourself you've got this. Remember, the Director needs to cast their show, so it is your job to persuade them you are the best person for the cast,

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Actor Headshots

Some Dos and Don'ts ... Mostly Don'ts

Here's a list of general dos and don'ts regarding headshots:

Size Does Matter! Industry standard is 8x10. Stick with that.

No Kodak Moments. Whatever you do, don't use snapshots.

No Xerox Moments, Either. Don't use photocopies.

No Glamour Shots. Don't use portrait studio or any other chain photographs for your headshots. This is a professional headshot, not your Senior Yearbook photo.

Act Your Age. Don't try to get your headshot to make you look younger (or older) than you really are.

Mind Your Character. Be careful about having headshots taken in character. Don't lock yourself into such a specific look that you limit yourself in other ways.

Black and White or Color. Make sure the headshot is taken from the shoulders up and that your clothing and background do not pull focus from your face.

Be Yourself. Remember that people want to see you in a headshot, the real you, the truest version of you - not how vast and exotic your wardrobe is or how many funny faces you can make.



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Acting Resume Tips!

Dos and Don'ts

DO

- Print, glue or staple your resume to the back of your headshot. Use only one staple in the upper left corner.
- If you are stapling, trim your resume to fit the headshot. Cut your resume to 8x10.
- Make sure the contact information on the back is up-to-date, and that you have a professional email address. (surfchick3000 is not a professional address)
- If you have a lot of projects, it's better to list the best ones.

DON'T

- **Don't lie about your experience.** The theatre world is *very* connected. You never know who knows whom.
- Don't make up special skills or write things down just so to fill in the special skill area.
- Don't use a resume that is larger than 8 1/2 x 11.
- Don't use a resume that is more than one page.
- Don't staple reviews or clippings to your resume. They just get in the way.
- Don't make the type smaller than 10 pt. If you have that much experience, edit it down.
